

This quarter I want to give a shout out to the writer's organization <u>Women Writing the West</u> (WWW). Despite the name, not all members are women. And even if you aren't writing about women in the west, you will find a supportive and educational group.

An agent at a publishing seminar recommended that every writer seek out a writer's group, particularly in one's genre. I don't recall how I found WWW, but I believe they were key to my publishing success.

Shortly after joining, I attended an online class to learn how to pitch my book. In October each year, they have a conference, online in odd years, in-person in even years. At the 2021 conference, I met the acquisitions editor for TwoDot and she invited me to submit my book proposal. The rest is history.

Even if you haven't completed a single article or chapter, you can benefit from belonging to a writer's organization. Many offer critique sessions, pitching opportunities, writing classes, professional advice, and more.
